The application for relief as reproduced on the reverse side was found in "No-Mans-Land". At this writing nothing can be said regarding the fate of the four soldiers concerned.

How big is your Chance?

Every soldier can reckon approximately how long he will last on the front. Since D-Day very conclusive statistics have been made in regard to American losses.

Accordingly the average "Length of Life" on the front is:

Soldiers 64 day	/S
N. C. O's 59 day	ys
Platoon leaders 51 day	
Com. commanders 48 day	7S

These figures indicate that the average soldier in his respective rank group remains in active front service 48-64 days before he is either killed wounded or taken prisoner. The calculations are based on facts gathered from among American units on the German front. (Furlough and details to the rear have not been taken into account).

In military circles it is expected that the coming Winter-Offensive will decidedly increase the hazards thus cutting these figures to a still lower minimum.

Therefore one is seriously concerned that the example of the 110 US Inf. Regt., where 17 men gave themselves up voluntarily at Aachen will repeat itself on a much larger scale. The confusion caused by large scale attacks greatly facilitates the running over and the enabling of many to seek details in the rear.
